DEATH OF MAJOR GREAVES.

The following is an extract from the *Liverpool Daily Post* of Monday, 6th inst:—In our obituary column the death of Major G. H. Greaves is recorded, it having taken place at his residence, Alfred-road Claughton, on Saturday last. The deceased who was in his sixty-fifth year, was well known in military circles in Liverpool, where he acted as adjutant of the 18th L.R.V. for several years. Major Greaves took a great interest in his work, and his retirement from the 18th L.R.V. was due solely to the rule of the War Office by which is incumbent upon an officer after a certain number of years' service to retire. He was very popular with his fellow-officers and with the men under him, and great regret was expressed at the time of his retirement, which took place in 1881. The deceased was the author of several valuable works on military matters, one of his latest being a pamphlet explaining the new formation of attack. His regiment was about the first in Liverpool to adopt the system. The funeral will take place at Flaybrick-hill Cemetery on Wednesday next, at noon.

[Major Greaves, who had served for a long time in India, was the last surviving brother of Mrs MacKern, Oreland.—Ed. L. C.]
