MILITARY FUNERAL.

A very solemn and imposing spectacle took
place in the city to-day, namely, the funeral,
with full military honours, of Mr G. A. Martin,
chief warder of the garrison prison, who died
early last Sunday morning. The *cortege* started
from the New Barracks at two o'clock, being
headed by a firing party of the 1st Battalion
King's Royal Rifles, in full-dress uniform, and
the full band of the regiment, under Mr F.
Tyler, bandmaster. The coffin was covered with
a Union Jack and several wreaths of beautiful
flowers, and on it were laid the cap and sword of
the deceased. It rested on a gun carriage drawn
by six splendid dark-coloured horses belonging
to the L Battery, 2nd Brigade, R.A. Behind the
coffin followed the relatives of the deceased, and
a large party of the 60th Rifles, including about
20 sergeants. As the procession passed down
George-street, on its way to St Mary's Cathedral,
where the interment took place, it pre-
sented a most imposing appearance, the
band playing that solemn yet sweet composition,
Beethoven's Dead March. When the *cortege*
arrived at the gates of the Cathedral the coffin
was consigned to the shoulders of four military
warders, who carried it to the burying place.
Archdeacon Hamilton officiated, a large number
of civilians assembling around the grave while
the funeral service was read. After three volleys
had been fired, the company of Rifles fell in, and
to the strains of a lively quick step, marched
back to the barracks.
