On Thursday the Shannon Navigation Bill came before Lord Redesdale's Committee as an unopposed scheme, and formal evidence in support of the preamble having been given, the committee stage was passed, and the bill was ordered to be reported for third reading.

The application of the Limerick and Kerry Railway Company against the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company, complaining of the management by the Waterford and Limerick Company, was heard by the Railway Commissioners yesterday, and after full discussion was ordered to stand dismissed with costs.

Yesterday morning a sad case of drowning occurred at Kilrush.
