This morning some thirteen samples of milk were taken in the market by Mr James Forrest, High Constable, in the presence of the Mayor. The milk was tested with a lactometer, the result showing the degrees of water to vary from two to twelve, the latter being two degrees in excess of the limit fixed by law.
