#### DEATH OF MR. HENRY LYONS OF CROOM.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Henry  
Lyons, D.L. of Croom House, in this county,  
which occurred on Saturday last in London. The  
deceased gentleman left home early in August last  
for Baden, where he sojourned annually to enjoy  
the baths for which that resort is renowned.  
While in Baden Mr Lyons contracted an abscess  
in the ear and it is thought that on the return  
journey to London he caught cold which caused  
the abscess to become aggravated. When he  
arrived at the English metropolis he was taken  
suddenly ill and died at Cohen's Hotel, Albemarle  
street, on Saturday. The mortal remains of the  
deceased arrived at the local termini at  
one o'clock to-day from Dublin. A large num-  
ber of the tenants of the deceased gentleman and  
his employes, with the Roman Catholic clergy of  
Croom, met the train on the platform, and the  
coffin was carried from the train to the hearse,  
which waited to convey it to Croom, on the shoul-  
ders of eight of his tenants. Mr Lyons was a  
deputy lieutenant of the county, and at one time  
county high sheriff. He married about 12 years  
ago a daughter of Lord Robert Montague, and  
niece of the Duke of Manchester, and leaves six  
young children, three boys and three girls, the  
eldest son, James Denis, being only 8 years of  
age. Mr Lyons owned flour mills at Croom, which  
he lately greatly improved, and also a bakery  
in Limerick. As an employer, landlord, and  
magistrate he was generally esteemed. The  
funeral will take place at Croom on Thursday  
next.
