DEATH OF MR. HENRY LYONS OF CROOM.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Henry Lyons, D.L. of Croom House, in this county, which occurred on Saturday last in London. The deceased gentleman left home early in August last for Baden, where he sojourned annually to enjoy the baths for which that resort is renowned. While in Baden Mr Lyons contracted an abscess in the ear and it is thought that on the return journey to London he caught cold which caused the abscess to become aggravated. When he arrived at the English metropolis he was taken suddenly ill and died at Cohen's Hotel, Albemarle street, on Saturday. The mortal remains of the deceased arrived at the local termini at one o'clock to-day from Dublin.
