The monthly meeting of the Limerick Market Trustees was held yesterday in the Boardroom Chamber of Commerce, the Mayor presiding— The other members present were—Denis F. THE SHOCKING OCCURENCE AT THE LIMERICK WORKHOUSE.

INQUEST ON DECRASED.

Mr Coroner Casey, of Mitchelstown, in the absence of Dr Cleary, who is away on leave, attended at the Workhouse bo-day, and opened an inquest touching the death of the old blind woman. Margaret Bourke, in connection with whose last hours it was stated that the grosset inhumanity had been perpetrated. The Coroner stated that he had telegraphed to the Attorney-General for permission to disinter the body. Mr Doyle, solr, watched the proceedings on behalf of Miss Garvey, one of the paid night nurses, against whom the Master reported; at yesterday's board.

Mr Sheahan, Master of the Workhouse, was examined, and gave evidence similar to the report which he furnished.

To Mr NoNamara—I never saw a woman's hands tied before.

Mary Jane Garvey deposed—I am paid nurse in the Jimerick Union Hospital at the female side; I knew the deceased Margaret Bourke; on the 24th April deceased Margaret Bourke; on the 24th April deceased between 2 and 3 o'clock; I found the hands tied; Mary Anne Fitzgerald, the assistant nurse, was there; mear deceased; she said it was she tied her hands; I took off the handkerchief; I told her not to do it again; about 6.30 I called and found the woman dead; the day nurse; told me the hands of the deceased were tied when she died, and she unloosed them; I did not suspect Mary Anne Fitzgerald, nor did I examine deceased's hands at any of my visite; the deceased came out of the bed four fimes that night, and I put her back again; when I loosed the handkerchief I aranged the sheet in a particular way around her which seemed not to be disturbed for the remainder of the morning; a patient on a former occasion got insane, and by orders of Dr Butler I tied her hands.

Jamy Anne Fitzgerald stated—I told her that the woman; was dying, and not to tie her hands again; the nurse said that she was dying as much as I was, that she was an old acting lunatic; she also told the patients that if she fell out of the jed and broke her skull not to dare attempt to call her again.

Coroner—Nowithstanding you left the patients in charge of such a woman; reported the death to Sister Stanlaus in the morning; and told her that her hands were tied.

Mary Chine, a patient in the ward in which deceased died, said she saw Miss Garvey tie the hands of deceased. Mary Anne Fitzgerald did not tie her hands.

Eliza Wall and another patient corroborated the statement as to the tying of the hands by Miss Garvey.

Ellen Mramars, day nurse, deposed that she found the woman dead in the morning with her hands tied. When Miss Garvey heard it she said "Oh, God."

Dr Nolan deposed that the woman was suffering from heart disease and bronchitis. He could not say whether the tying of the hands accelerated death, but no one could deny the inhumanity and barbarity of the proceeding. He believed death was accelerated by the woman being allowed to be twenty minutes on the floor, and not getting drinks.

The inhumant was addignined at five to ten.
