A STRANGE STORY OF MURDER.
 The Adriatic, which arrived in Queenstown on Saturday, brought files of the American papers of the 18th inst. containing particulars of the discovery of the mysterious murder of a woman named Chapman, fourteen years ago, in London. The particulars of that murder are of a very extraordinary character. About a year before the murder of Mrs Chapman, her husband, Joseph Chapman, together with two men named Joseph Reilly and Carlo Sissocovitch, were arrested in Turkey for forgery, and were sent to prison. Mrs Chapman, on hearing of her husband's arrest, left London and went to Turkey, and, making her way into the prison, she was able to communicate with Reilly and Sissocovitch. Chapman at the time had been guilty of a breach of discipline and was undergoing punishment in a dark cell on bread and water. His associates promised to assist in the escape of Chapman if Mrs Chapman would supply them with files and other tools.
