FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR CAREY'S ROAD.

Last evening a melancholy accident took place in Carey's Road, resulting in the death of a little boy named John Joseph Meehan, aged seven years. It would appear from the evidence given before Mr M. J. DeCourcy, City Coroner, who held an inquest to-day at Carey's Road, touching the cause of death, that at about half-past five o'clock a youth named Michael Benson returned to his father's house with a horse and jarvey car, having been engaged at his usual avocation during the day. The boy left the horse outside Benson's house at Carey's Road, providing the animal with a feed in a "nose-bag," and tying, it was stated, the reins to to a common cart close by. Young Benson then went inside to have his tea, and immediately a drove of pigs which were being taken from the railway passed up the road. A number of the porkers got under the horse's legs, and becoming frightened the animal dashed up the street towards the Park. The deceased boy, who, probably, was playing on the roadway or near it, was knocked down by the runaway, and one of the wheels passing over the poor little boy crushed him terribly, and death ensued almost immediately. Benson, senior, and some residents lifted the child up, and did all they could for him, but their services were futile-he beyond their care. The body was quickly taken to the residence of the child's father who is an engine driver on the Waterford and Limerick Railway, and the matter was reported to the Police who subsequently took young Benson into custody and had him remanded till Monday. The jury after hearing the evidence of several witnesses returned a verdict to the effect that death resulted from injuries caused by the boy being rolled over by a car the property of Patrick Benson, and that the occurrence was accidental.
