We regret to announce the death, which took

to give up work altogether. By Mr Putland's
death the Fishery Board have lost a courteous
and efficient officer. The funeral took place to-
day, at 12 o'clock.

Indignation meetings are quite the thing just
now. One is about to be held in Kilfinane to con-
demn the action of a lady who has taken legal
proceedings against a number of her tenants for
the recovery of rents. It is stated—with what
amount of truth we know not—that the owner-
ship of the property in question was originally
acquired through the assistance of the tenants
themselves, and great capital will of course be
made out of this to inspire sympathy on behalf
of the tenants.

The design and object of the local branch of
the House League were the subject under con-
sideration at a meeting held on Sunday night at the
Town Hall. The aim of the League as set forth
in the course of discussion appears to be to de-
vote its attention not only to the rack-rents of
houses but to rates and taxes. The alleged in-
justice of obliging the occupiers of houses to pay
the whole of the borough rates will be agitated
against, and an effort made to have half placed
on the shoulders of the landlords. It was
specially pointed out that the league had no in-
tention of doing anything likely to interfere
with enterprising persons who may be building
or intending to build new houses.

At the Rathkeale Petty Sessions yesterday,
before Captain Hatchell, R.M., Acting-Sergeant
Morrissy charged Robert T Casey with having
his licensed premises open for the sale of in-
toxicating drink on Sunday, 13th inst. The
Acting-Sergeant stated that he entered the pre-
mises where he found several men from the town
drinking. A fine of 10s was imposed. Three
other men who were also prosecuted for a similar
offence were fined a shilling each. Head-Con-
stable O'Sullivan charged a rowdy named Michael
O'Donnell, with drunkenness, for which a fine of
2s 6d was imposed. Constable Duffy prosecuted
two men named O'Leary and Sheehy, for drunken-
ness and disorderly conduct, fines of 5s each
being inflicted. Sergeant Rourke put forward a
man named Sheehy on a similar charge, and a
like rule was observed.
