Indignation meetings are quite the thing just now. One is about to be held in Kilfinane to condemn the action of a lady who has taken legal proceedings against a number of her tenants for the recovery of rents. It is stated—with what amount of truth we know not—that the ownership of the property in question was originally acquired through the assistance of the tenants themselves, and great capital will of course be made out of this to inspire sympathy on behalf of the tenants.

The design and object of the local branch of the House League were the subject under consideration at a meeting held on Sunday night at the Town Hall. The aim of the League as set forth in the course of discussion appears to be to devote its attention not only to the rack-rents of houses but to rates and taxes. The alleged injustice of obliging the occupiers of houses to pay the whole of the borough rates will be agitated against, and an effort made to have half placed on the shoulders of the landlords. It was specially pointed out that the league had no intention of doing anything likely to interfere with enterprising persons who may be building or intending to build new houses.
