FATAL DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Yesterday afternoon, Mr M. J. DeCourcy, City Coroner, with a jury, held an inquest at Mr Manahan's public-house, Athlunkard street touching the death of Patrick Quin, aged 40, a labourer residing in Courthouse lane, in the Abbey, who was drowned in a stream running into the Abbey river from Lough Mills, on Sunday evening last.

Sergeants Hinch and Stevenson watched the

proceedings on behalf of the Crown.

Mary Quin, mother of deceased, deposed that she lived in Courthouse lane, in the Abbey. The deceased left her house at two o'clock on Sunday in the best of health, and at five o'clock his dead body was taken into his house. He was about

40 years of age and unmarried.

John Bolton, labourer, deposed that he knew the deceased; was in company with him on Sunday; John Kennedy was with them; they went out bathing at the back of Lough Mills; witness was the first in and he told the other two there were weeds there; himself and Kennedy swam up to the arch where the water comes out from the wheel of the mill; deceased did not go so far—they left him behind them; they came back to the bank and began to dress and Kennedy, on seeing Quin's clothes near his, asked where Quin was, when a youngster on the bank said that "he went down there;" witness thought it was the sally grove he meant and he was proceeding there when the boy said "underneath you," meaning that deceased had sunk in the water; Kennedy looked for deceased but witness was unable to give any assistance owing to the fright he got; he saw the body lifted and placed in a cot; deceased must have been under the water for a quarter of an hour; the occurrence took place about five o'clock in the evening.

By a Juror—He did not see the man drowning or if he did he would have attempted to save

John Kennedy deposed that the deceased man was the last to get into the water; Bolton told himself and Quin not to get out where they proposed as there were weeds in the water, but they did not take his advice; Bolton and witness swam up the stream and on their return were told deceased was under the water; witness dived six times and saw the body at the bottom; he lifted it up but failed to place it on the bank; about five minutes after a man named Martin Clancy put the body into a cot and took it home; the children, a number of whom were on the bank, did not call out that the man was drowning; Quin was a first-class swimmer, and he believed he was caught in the weeds as he was diving; the tide was just falling at the time; it

was a quarter to six when the man was drowned.
