Mr De Courcey, Coroner, held an inquest yesterday, touching the death of a man named Matthew Sexton, about 50 years of age, who died suddenly at his house in Vyse's Fields, at 9 o'clock on Sunday morning. The deceased who had been in the service of the Harbour Board as dock gateman for ten or twelve years, was engaged at his work until 5 o'clock on the same morning on which he died. The medical testimony shewed that death was the result of asthmatic bronchitis, and a verdict in accordance was returned.

We would direct the attention of the Constabulary Authorities to an apparently trivial matter, but one which, if allowed to go on, will develop into a nuisance. Complaints have been made to us that ragged children and loafers are in the habit of congregating outside the Post Office, and up the lane in its vicinity, thereby causing great obstruction to those wishing to post letters.
