DISTURBANCES IN FRANCE.

Disturbances occurred at Marseilles yesterday
in the neighbourhood of St Martin's Church.
Several persons were arrested for uttering sedi-
tious cries. Serious rioting also took place yes-
terday at Lyons. Seven hundred glass makers
on strike attacked a manufactory, and the work-
men inside surrendered without resistance.
