AT DERRY.
The Londonderry correspondent writes from the Maiden City Protestant meeting on Monday, London-street, in celebration of the centenary of the battle of Derry, two lemonade stalls were set up, and with lighted candles were thrown from a balcony. The fuses, however, were not lit, and the bottles broke in the street. The police are investigating the cause, and reports are yet made. The Rev. Mr. Herbert, a Protestant curate, of St Augustine's Church, was struck in the mouth by a brick, and he could not attend the meeting.

N BURMAH.
The London telegraph contains a telegram from Rangoon yesterday, stating that there was a sharp engagement at Youghal between 250 insurgents and British troops, led by Colonel Poole. Two of the British officers and nine Sepoys were killed, and most of the rest were wounded. Reinforcements were sent from Singoo on the west bank of the river, and about 400 Shaans and Dacoits. The British were successful among the troops in the Youghal, and Napeh districts.

Many can remember the brilliant feats of cricket performed by Mr Lambkin on the Mardyke and other cricket fields, efforts of skill which are still remembered with pride by the Cork County, Queen's College, and Summerhill Cricket Clubs, of which he was for many years a member. During the last two or three years that Mr Lambkin has resided at Youghal he has made a host of friends, and his demise, at an early age, is deeply regretted by those who enjoyed his acquaintance. Mr Lambkin was seized with a sudden illness on Sunday last, and notwithstanding the care and skill of his medical attendants he never rallied, and passed away on yesterday morning at 8 o'clock.
