THE CANADIAN FISHERIES QUESTION.—The
 question raised by the seizure last month of the
 American schooner David J. Adams in Digby
 Basin will shortly be brought before a court of
 law at the instance of the Canadian authorities,
 who desire that the matter should be fully tried
 out. The offences with which the vessel will be
 charged are that she violated the Customs laws,
 that she committed an infraction of the Dominion
 Fisheries Act of 1868, in buying bait, and finally,
 that she violated the terms of the Convention of
 1818 between Great Britain and the United
 States.

A MOMENTOUS ISSUE.—The *Times* says—The
