DOUBLE RESCUE OF A WOULD-BE SUICIDE IN DUBLIN.—Yesterday a young man, apparently between twenty-five and thirty-five years of age, threw himself into the river between High-street and Grattan Bridge. He was immediately swept away by the current, and was in a very precarious position when two men in a boat managed to take him from the river. A second danger then threatened the reckless individual, for the police appeared on the scene with the evident intention of preferring a charge of attempted suicide. The boatmen, however, were determined that the dripping third occupant of the boat should not suffer any further inconvenience from his rash conduct, so they pulled heartily until they passed the Metal Bridge, when they managed to land their passenger, who deftly ran up a bye street and escaped the pursuing police.
