## FATAL RESULT OF AN ACCIDENT

The man named James Ryan, (24) unmarried, the Newport carrier, in the employ of Mrs Allen. Newport, who sustained a fractured skull and other injuries through falling under a heavily laden car in William street, on Tuesday evening, under circumstances already reported in these columns, succumbed to his injuries last night about half-past nine. The deceased was conscious only for a very short interval from the time of the accident up to his demise. Mr Mathew J. DeCourcy, City Coroner, held an inquest this afternoon on the body at Barrington's Hospital. Head-constable Wall watched the case on behalf of the police. Mr Robert M'Cutcheon, Newport, identified the body of the deceased.

Dr George Browning, Resident Surgeon at Barrington's Hospital, said the deceased was admitted on Tuesday afternoon in an unconscious condition, comiting blood, and bleeding from the nose. The left arm was fractured. He was also

suffering from concussion of the brain.

Wm Goold, in the employ of Mr John Guinane, said that on the day in question, about 3 o'clock, he saw the horse in charge of the deceased stumble, and recovered by the deceased. It stumbled a second time, and when he looked again he saw Ryan under the car, with his hand under the wheel. He shouted for help to have the car lifted off Ryan's hand. When that was done he went for Dr Graham. The head seemed as if the car had come in contact with it. ceased was leading the horse by the head.

James Hayes, in the employ of Mr Bryan O'Donnell, had his attention directed to the accident by a young lady in the shop, who said there was a man killed. On looking he saw a man lying under a car. It seemed as if the man's head had been crushed by the wheel. The wheel had not, he thought, passed over the head altogether.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.
