SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Yesterday afternoon, about four o'clock, a little girl named Mary Vaughan, aged seven years, and daughter of a labourer residing at the Quarry Road, Thomondgate, proceeded with her brother to an open space abutting the river near the distillery, for the purpose of getting a can of water. While filling the vessel, the child appears to have slipped and tumbled into the water. She was immediately carried out into deep water by the current, the tide being about half full at the time, and in a few seconds was about eighty yards from the bank. The little brother, who is a year her senior, cried for help, and two boys immediately arrived, one of whom, Denis McInerney, at once divested himself of his clothes and swam to the drowning girl's assistance. He rescued the child, who was still floating, but life was found to be extinct. The body was taken to Vaughan's house, a short distance away from where the fatality occurred, and to-day an inquest touching the cause of death was held by Mr M. J. DeCourcy and a jury. Evidence was given embodying the facts stated above. The deceased's father, Michael Vaughan, deposed that the place where the child went for water was resorted to by the public for procuring their supply, that formerly the open space was on a level with the water, but that within the last nine years a lot of rubbish had been thrown there by the Distillery Company, so that the ground was now sixteen feet over low water mark, and was in a dangerous state. was a slip thirty yards further up, but this, he stated, was for the convenience of those living in the houses near it. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, and added: "We consider the place where she fell in, and which is used as a public watering place, in a dangerous condition." Serjeant Whelan, Thomondgate, conducted the inquiry on behalf of the Crown.

FATAL RESULT OF AN ACCIDENT.

The man named James Ryan, (24) unmarried, the Newport carrier, in the employ of Mrs Allen, New port, who sustained a fractured skull and other injuries through falling under a heavily laden car in William street, on Tuesday evening, under circumstances already reported in these columns, succumbed to his injuries last night about half-past nine. The deceased was conscious only for a very short interval from the time of the accident up to his demise. Mr Mathew J.
