Ennis monthly fair is held on the first Saturday of every month.

Kilkeo Fairs—5th October, 26th November, 4th February, second Tuesday in January, and third Monday in April, each year. There is also a monthly market for the sale of pigs held on the second Tuesday of each month.

Fairs are held in the city of Limerick on the first and third Tuesday of every month for pigs, and on the first Thursday of every month for cattle and sheep; and in the city of Cork on the first Thursday of every month.
