MUTTON was in quality 4d per lb. There was a fair supply of young cattle, which were on requisition at the following prices—Three year olds sold at from £8 to £9 15s each; secondary kinds £7 to £8 17s 6d; two year olds sold generally at from £5 to £8; year and a half olds and advanced yearlings, which were in no requisition, sold at from £3 to £4; calves, 38s to £2 10s. The strippers on exhibition were of an inferior quality. Good strippers sold at from £7 to £9; secondary kinds sold generally at from £5 to £8; springers were in improved demand, and good class animals met with ready sale at from £9 to £11 each; secondary £6 to £9 10s. Milch cows also met with ready demand, the supply of this class of cattle in market being small. There was no improvement in price, the general quotations being from £7 to £12 each, the latter being the highest figure. The supply of sheep was fair, and the prices recently quoted were maintained. Good hogget ewes and wethers sold at 35s each. Fat sheep sold at from £1 15s to £2 3s each. Bon- hams sold at from 23s to 50s per pair. Very few horses on sale.

#### DEATH OF LADY CLARINA.

It is with extreme regret we announce the death of Lady Clarina after a comparatively short illness. The sad event took place at Elm Park on Sunday evening last, at half-past seven. The deceased lady is mother of Lieutenant-General Lord Clarina, and daughter of the late Mr Hugh Barton, Straffan, County Kildare. She married the third Lord Clarina in 1828, and died in her 77th year. During the course of a comparatively long life Lady Clarina manifested an unassuming and unobtrusive goodness which endeared her to all classes. Her many excellent qualities in private life, her genial and kindly disposition won the regard of all admitted to her friendship. Her charity to the poor of the district in which she lived was unbounded, and her gifts to the Church in which she worshipped with simple piety Sunday after Sunday were munificent. Lady Clarina's benevolence of disposition, her geniality, and her ready sympathy adorned the high position which she so admirably filled, and her life, prolonged beyond the usual space, was in many respects worthy of our sincere admiration. The memory of this excellent lady will long be cherished with respectful affection by all those residing in the neighbourhood, where she was so well known. The funeral will leave Elm Park on Thursday morning at 11 o'clock for Kilkeedy Church, where the remains will be interred in the family vault.
