THURSDAY EVENING, NOVEMBER 18, 1886 Ir is with extreme pain and regret that we feel our duty to refer to one of the most appleasant incidents which has occurred at the Limerick Board of Guardians within our ecollection. Yesterday at the meeting of the Board, Mr. AMBROSE HALL, J.P., proposed vote of condolence with Lord CLARINA on the death of his deeply-lamented mother. The proposer of the resolution deservedly eulogised the many excellent qualities which the deceased lady possessed-he unbounded charity and onstant and practical interest which evinced in the poor, not only of the locality in which she lived, but even in those residing outsite it, whom she frequently aided in the most liberal and yet unestentatious manner. His observations were cordially endorsed by the seconder, Dr. O'SHAUGHNESSY, and by Mr. DELMEGE, who supported the proposition.
Several resolutions of a like character have I from time to time unanimously passed by the Board, expressing not only sympathy with a Quardian on the death of a near relative, but actually adjourning the Board in consequence of the event. It will, therefore, be seen that there was a clear precedent for Mr. Harn's resolution, and we presume that not the slightest objection to its passing was for an instant anticipated by those who putit forward. However, the contrary proved to be the case.
Mr. JAMES O'MARA set the ball rolling by putting the extraordinary question, " Would a rote of condolence be passed to a Nationalist Guardian on the death of his mother?" It is the first time we have heard of the question of politics having anything to do with the passing of a vote of condolence. The irrepressible Mr. MINERNY, following the example which had been set by Mr. O'MARA, then jumped up and declared that he would propose an amendment, and force it to a division should the resotion be pressed; and in the same breath he declared that" he was twice as good a man as Lord CLARINA." Now any one possessing a knowledge of our Poor Law Board is well aware of Mr. M'INERNY's importance, in his own estimation. And so there was no necessity for estimation. And so there was no necessity for his rehinding us of it yesterday. Mr. M'INERN'S worth as a public man we dare say is thoroughly appreciated by his few admirers, but outside these Mr. M'INERN'S opinions carry with them not the slightest importance or weight in any degree. So much for this particular phase of the question. But Mr. M'INERNY evidently believed that he had struck on a point which he considered unanswerable when he asked, "Why was not a vote of condolence passed to the widow and family of the late Mr, PURCELL, one of the Nationalist But we put an equally pertinent Guardiana?" question—Why was it not proposed? Does Mr. M'INERNY, or do his Nationalist fellow-Guardians, believe for one moment that if a vote of condolence were proposed to the family of a Nationalist Guardian, an ex-officio member, or any Guardian having the slightest pretension to a gon deman, would stand up and object to it? We give the Nationalist Guardians more credit for better discrimination than to believe any-thing of the kind. No. The "honor" of objecting has been given to Messrs. MINERNY and Co., and we congratulate them on the spirit they have displayed. Mr. MINERNY has the credit of being the first to break a rule which has been in existence in almost overy public Board in the city for generations. Frequently, as we have said, Guardians and Corporators have sunk their differences, political or otherwise, and united in expressing sympathy with a member who, by the will of Providence, had lost a near or dear relative Not only that, but votes of condolence were passed nemine dissentiente to the friends of outsiders who were in no way connected with the Board, in case of death.
