FOOTBALL—On Thursday last a football match took place on the Abbey Ground, Tipperary, between one of the Abbey's weaker XV. and Clanwilliam's 3rd XV. It resulted in a draw in favour of the latter. At the beginning the match was very even, until one of the Abbey quarters got a brilliant try, but which was more than counter-balanced shortly afterwards by one of their best men receiving a hurt in the knee, and having to be borne from the field in consequence. Clanwilliam then taking the Abbey on the rush, bore them back to their own goal, where, however, a fierce stand was made on the part of the Abbey, in which one of their halves nearly retrieved their fallen honour by a valiant attempt to rush it back to the opponent's goal, but was stopped by a charge on the part of Clanwilliam by Power. Amongst those who distinguished themselves on the side of Clanwilliam were—Power (captain), Sadler, and Quane. On that of the Abbey—G. Stoney (captain), Herriett, and Warburton.

SUICIDE OF A SOLDIER.—Yesterday, a soldier named Samuel Howard, a private of the 18th Hussars, shot himself at the New Barracks and died shortly afterwards from the effects of the wound. It seems that the deceased for the past week or ten days appeared rather despondent, and was advised to see the doctor, but he refused saying he preferred doing duty. He said he was suffering from a cold and that he had a pain in his head. He was employed at stables up to 12.30 on yesterday when he left his work. Shortly after a discharge of a firearm in one of the apartments was heard, and a private named M'Gorovan having entered it found Howard lying on his back bleeding from the mouth. A carbine lay between his legs with the muzzle towards his mouth. Deceased never recovered consciousness. Medical evidence was to the effect that death resulted from concussion of the brain and fracture of the skull. An inquest was held to-day by Mr Coroner De Courcy, and a verdict of suicide while of unsound mind, was returned. Deceased had been ten years in the army and was about 30 years of age.
