MILITARY FUNERALS.—Yesterday the remains
of Private Howard, of the 18th Hussars, who
died at the New Barracks on Friday night from
the effects of a gun shot wound, self-inflicted
early on same day, were interred with military
honours at the Military Cemetery, King's Island.
The funeral procession, as is usually the case,
was very impressive, and from the barracks to
the Island it was accompanied by a very large
concourse. A firing party of the Hussars, with
their carbines reversed, headed the *cortège*, and
after them came the band of the Leinster Regi-
ment with muffled drums, playing the "Dead
March in Saul." Next came a gun carriage of the
Royal Artillery, on which rested the coffin,
covered with the Union Jack and the
busby, belt, carbine, &c., belonging to the de-
ceased. Immediately behind the gun carriage
was the horse of the deceased caparisoned in
black with white ribbons and streamers, while
the late soldier's boots were depended from the
stirrups of the saddle. A number of the Hussars
in undress uniform, some of them wearing white
sashes, brought up the rere. The cemetery was
reached shortly before three o'clock. A soldier
of the Leinster Regiment was also buried with
full honours at St Laurence's Cemetery to-day.
