ALLEGED MANSLAUGHTER.—The Mayor and Mr
Irwin, R.M, presided at the City Police Court
this morning. Thomas Cross, dock labourer,
was brought up on remand charged with having
caused the death of one Thomas McInerney, who
resided in Vyses Fields. It will be remembered
that the accused struck the deceased on the face
on the 19th October, and caused a pipe stem
to penetrate the eye. The medical evidence
showed on Tuesday last that death was the re-
sult of an abscess on the brain, and the jury
found that the blow had been struck by Cross,
but not with the intention of doing any serious
bodily harm. Prisoner was returned for trial to
the assizes, bail being accepted in £50, and two
sureties of £25 each. John O'Neill (16), was re-
manded to petty sessions on a charge of stealing

CAPTAIN PLUNKET AND THE PAYMENT OF
