

McDonnell did so.

McNamara—It will be seconded unani-

The chairman said that he would have much
in putting the sentiments expressed by
McDonnell in the form of a resolution. It
perhaps be some consolation to their old
friend to know that his services had
been appreciated, and that his severance with the
was as much regretted.

The resolution, of Mr McDonnell was un-
ly passed.

The mover suggested that the Board should
elect for a new secretary at a salary of £75
per annum.

McNamara—Let the salary be £50. I think
that amount is quite enough.

The mover considered that £75 was not too
high a salary for the office, as the person to be
elected should be like Mr Carroll, and do the
duties of secretary and treasurer. Under the Act
of 1854 it was necessary to have an hono-
rarium, and he would agree with Mr
Carroll to have the secretary's salary fixed at
£75 and the treasurer's at £50.

McNamara remarked that he would be for
the secretary £50, and the treasurer £25.

Mr Boyd informed the meeting that he was for
the year and ten months discharging the
duties of treasurer and secretary without remunera-
tion. Naturally, his clerks objected to doing
work without extra pay, and if they got
nothing for that board in which he
had such an interest.

The mover agreed to advertise for a secretary and
treasurer at a salary of £50 and £25 respectively,
and the election to take place on this day fortnight.

The mover stated that a letter had been received
from Messrs Quilter, Ball and Co, in refer-
ence to the application made by the Trustees to
the London & Lancashire Assurance Society, to reduce the
interest on the debt of £20,000 from 5 to 4
percent per annum. The application would
be brought under the notice of the directors at
the next meeting, and Messrs Quilter, Ball and
Co (the mover) stated would mean a saving of
£1,000 per year to the Trustees.

The mover said that the increase in the market
value of what had come of this year, as compared
with the corresponding period of last year, was
very satisfactory. It
