FUNERAL OF DR BUTLER.

The funeral of Dr William G Butler, senior, resident physician of the Limerick Union, who died at Queenstown on Thursday last, took place this morning. The remains arrived in Limerick at 10.30 o'clock by the Cork direct train, and were immediately transferred to a hearse and conveyed to Raheen, some four miles from the city, where the interment took place. Notwithstanding the inclement state of the weather, rain having fallen in torrents during the morning, the funeral cortege was exceedingly large and representative, all classes and creeds from city and county attending to pay a last tribute to the memory of a young gentleman cut off in the bloom of manhood, and at the commencement of a prosperous and honourable career. The coffin, which was of polished oak, and decorated with immortelles, placed on it by loving hands, bore the following inscription:—
