SCIENCE AND ART EXAMINATIONS AT LEAMY'S

and Art department, South Kensington, commu-
nicated to the local secretary, the Rev James
Dowd, the result of the examination in mathe-
matics, held recently at Leamy's School. The

DEATH OF DR. GEORGE FRIEND.—It is with
much regret we announce the death of this pro-
mising physician which took place at Boher on
the 20th inst, at the early age of 26. The disease,
which ended fatally, was the result of a cold
caught in a London hospital, and sad to say, only
a few days before his intended sailing for a warm
climate, where he proposed following his profes-
sion for some time. Endowed with remarkable
intellectual capacities his university career was
unusually brilliant, he obtained a large propor-
tion of the scholarships and prizes offered, and
was always one of the foremost men of his years.
His genial and amiable qualities endered him to
all with whom he came in contact, and his
cheerful disposition will be long remembered by
his fellow students and all who had the pleasure
of his acquaintance.

ACTION AGAINST THE LIMERICK STEAMSHIP
COMPANY.—Mr Richard Phillips sued the above
company for £1,244, £1,000 being for wrongful
dismissal, and £244 being on foot of account due
through the sale of coals. The case was to be
tried at last Assizes, but it was subsequently
referred to the arbitration of Mr Wm Beauchamp,
solicitor, who attended at the County Courthouse
to-day, to hear the case. Mr J Doyle, solicitor,
represented Mr Phillips, and Mr P S Connolly,
solicitor, the defendants. The accounts were of
a long and complicated character, and several
questions were raised upon the construction of
the original contract entered into between the
parties. Mr Phillips, Mr Wilson, and Mr
Pollexfen were examined on behalf of the plain-
tiff. Mr T P Morrissy, Mr Downey, and Mr W
Malcolmson, Portlaw, were examined on behalf
of the defendants, and after a full consideration
of the case, Mr Beauchamp awarded that in
place of the defendants being indebted to the
plaintiff in any sum, the plaintiff was indebted
to the defendants in the sum of £103, and gave a
verdict for them with costs.
