SERIOUS FOOTBALL ACCIDENT!—A rather serious accident occurred during the progress of a football match on Sunday between St. Michael's and the Drapers' Club. It appears that a young man named Lynch, a brother of the newly-elected schoolmistress at the workhouse, was just in the act of catching the ball when one of the members of the rival team accidentally struck him a heavy blow with his shoulder on the right side under the seventh or eighth rib, inflicting a rather serious injury. The unfortunate young man immediately fell to the ground quite helpless, and having been somewhat resuscitated by a few drops of brandy which a kind friend near at hand applied, he was conveyed to the Workhouse Hospital, where Dr Humphries administered restoratives. He did not recover consciousness until near 3 o'clock yesterday, and must have suffered terrible agonies. The place where the young man received the injury was very near the liver, and had the blow gone a little nearer it would probably have proved fatal. On inquiring at the hospital to-day we ascertained that he was progressing as well as could be expected.

DEATH OF DR. C. GLOSTER, PARTEEN.

A large circle of friends, not only in the city and neighbourhood but in the Metropolis and other parts of Ireland, will hear with regret of the death of Dr Charles Gloster, third son of the late Mr George Gloster, J P, of Parteen. The sad event occurred at the family seat, Parteen, near this city, on Sunday evening. Dr Gloster was a graduate of Trinity College, and had passed through its medical school with credit. During his undergraduate course the deceased gentleman occupied a prominent position in the athletic world, and few events would be considered complete without his presence and support. Especially was this true in aquatic circles, and Dr Gloster was considered one of the best oars of the University crew. Although his unrivalled physical powers did something to secure his popularity amongst his fellow students and associates his personal qualities did much more. His good temper under trying circumstances was remarkable, whilst his consideration for others and his complete unselfishness of disposition endeared him to all with whom he came in contact. Having departed from college, carrying with him the best wishes of his friends, he bought a practice at Normandy, in Yorkshire, which taxed even his energies to the utmost. An apparently slight cold contracted in the performance of his duties soon became of serious dimensions, and though the efforts of relatives left nothing undone that could be done, the disease developed alarming symptoms which terminated fatally.
