FUNERAL OF Miss SPILLANE—Yesterday morning the remains of Miss Agnes Spillane, second daughter of our respected fellow-citizen, Mr William Spillane, J P, George-street, were interred in the family vault, Mount St Lawrence cemetery. Notwithstanding the early hour (eight o'clock) at which the funeral took place, the cortege was large and representative, and included a large number of the principal merchants and traders of the city. The chief mourners were Mr Wm Spillane, J P., Mr John Spillane, and Mr Phillips, son-in-law. The Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, Roman Catholic Lord Bishop, officiated, and was assisted by Rev J O'Shea, Adm, St Michaels, Rev J O'Shaughnessy, CC, and Rev Mr Donor. Messrs P M'Carthy & Son, George-street, were the undertakers. The coffin, which was of solid polished oak was casket shaped, with ornamental brass mountings, and engraved breastplate. The deceased lady was only eighteen years of age.
