FUNERAL OF MRS O'CALLAGHAN.—The funeral of this much respected and lamented lady took place yesterday. The remains were removed from Eden terrace at 10 o'clock for interment at Tulla, and were accompanied from Limerick by a very large number of the citizens. Tulla was reached *via* Sixmile-bridge and Kilkishen, and all along the route the cortege was joined by the carriages of the principal residents of the surrounding districts; the owners in the majority of cases attending in person. Before the end of the journey was reached the funeral had assumed very large proportions, in fact was the largest seen in that part of the country for years, and it bore ample testimony, if such were necessary, to the high esteem in which the deceased lady was held by all classes and creeds throughout the county. The clergymen who officiated were the Rev Mr Greer, Rector of Tulla, Very Rev Dean Humphries, Quin, and Rev W J Clarke, Limerick. At the conclusion of the service, the Rev Mr Clarke addressed some very touching observations to the congregation, dwelling on the charitable and other virtuous qualities which the late Mrs O'Callaghan invariably displayed, and the coffin was then removed from the church to its last resting place in the family vault. Messrs P M'Carthy & Son, Limerick, were the undertakers.
