

THE LATE MOST REV DR CARBERY.

THE FUNERAL CEREMONY.

Yesterday the remains of the late Most Rev Dr Carbery, Roman Catholic Bishop of Hamilton, Ontario, who died in Cork on Sunday morning, were interred in the vault at St Saviour's Church, with which edifice he had been so long identified. On the previous evening the body was conveyed to Limerick by special train, and taken from the terminus on the shoulders of the people to the church. On that occasion as well as on yesterday the high esteem in which Dr Carbery was held by all classes of the community was amply demonstrated. For over 20 years he laboured in this city, and during that time was ever identified with every work of advantage to all classes of his people. When Dr Carbery came to Limerick he found the edifice in which his predecessors officiated, and in which he himself laboured, anything but adequate to the requirements of the congregation. He set himself to the task of raising funds for re-modelling, and to a large extent re-building the church of the Dominicans, and in a few years the handsome and magnificent edifice which now adorns Baker Place was erected on the ruins of the old church. The ornamentation of the church was also carried out at great expense and excellent taste. The remains of the late bishop were watched over for many hours on Thursday night by members of the various confraternities, who at intervals recited prayers, while in the evening the clergy of the church recited the rosary and requiems for the dead. The mitre of the deceased prelate was placed on the coffin, which was covered with immortelles and emblems of mourning and respect for the venerated bishop. At eleven o'clock the ceremonies previous to the solemn occasion were commenced. His Lordship, the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer presided. He was assisted at the throne by his chaplain, the Rev A Murphy. The celebrant was the Rev Father Wheeler, O P (nephew to Dr Carbery); deacon, Rev Father Purcell, O P, Prior, Athy; sub-deacon, Rev Father Ryan, O P, Limerick. The chanters were the Rev Father Higgins, Adm, St John's, and the Rev Father J O'Shea, Adm, St Michael's. The music was beautiful, and this portion of the service was conducted by Mr John F Murray, organist of St John's Cathedral. The choir consisted of a number of gentlemen selected from the choirs of the Cathedral, Redemptorists, and Dominican churches. The "Benedictus" at the end of Lauds was most impressively sung in eight-part harmony. At the High Mass the "Introit" and "Kyrie" rendered were by Casciolini. The "Dies Ira" was impressively grand and solemn, the plaintive strains of the plain chant, then the alternate verses of the four-part harmony being very striking. The whole musical portion of the service was worthy of the solemn occasion. The ceremonies having concluded, a procession was formed and the coffin was borne on the shoulders of the people to the vault within the enclosure at the right hand side of the church, and the last rites having been performed the remains of the much-loved prelate were lowered into their final resting place, the people being visably affected at the solemn scene.
