His dear predecessor and brother-in-law, Henry Reade, who for some years has been serving the Church Missionary Society as Secretary, was suddenly called to his rest in the year 1880, and gave up his spirit in a very young age in England, and in the following year (the speaker) received an intimation from the Church Missionary Society that they wished him to undertake the very responsible work which his father had ably carried on. When he received the intimation the first thing he said to his wife was "I have accepted this work I must go round the world because he realised he was going to undertake a very responsible and difficult work which required statistical knowledge which he did not possess. He had long loved the Church Missionary Society, and had long endeavoured to do what a poor parochial clergyman could manage to do in the neighbourhood of Southampton; but when he was called to his present position he always found it a difficult one to occupy. He realised that he must learn a good deal more about the work. At times he was asked the question—"What is your position, Mr Wigram?"—and he replied that he was supposed to be in the position of the spider in the centre of the web, feeling every vibration wherever the web would be touched. He had therefore been studying hard work, and had heard a good deal that was interesting. He had been at first perplexed regarding the methods pursued by the society regarding the many problems now waiting for solution, but he was greatly assisted by his son, who had graduated at Cambridge, and who he took out with him as secretary. The speaker here held up in his hand a little volume in which he said that he was desiring to become acquainted more fully with his tour would find a graphic description of a moderate figure.
