The deaths from the principal zymotic diseases in the 16 districts were equal to an annual rate of 1'4 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0'0 in 12 of the districts to 5'3 in Londonderry; the 18 deaths from all causes registered in that district comprising 2 from measles and 1 from diarrhoea. Among the 135 deaths from all causes registered in Belfast are 1 from measles, 1 from scarlatina, 1 from typhus, 1 from whooping-cough, 1 from phtheria, 1 from simple continued fever, 1 from enteric fever, and 4 from diarrhoea.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET, Thursday—(Sons' Report).—The numbers to-day show: of over 260 beasts, and 70 sheep, and in cattle trade became slower, especially for sheep, scarce, and therefore maintained late rates, but moved off with some difficulty. Sheep, however, a general reduction of 2s to 3s per head. Prime to 5s 6d per head; secondary and inferior, 4s 6d; prime wether, 8d per lb; ewe, 7d to 7½ 1,920; sheep, 4,184.

GLASGOW CATTLE MARKET, March; (Watson, and Robertson's Report).—The supply in this market to-day was larger than usual, and of prime quality. There was no improvement in demand, and no buyers for southern market, consequently prices ruled a little lower. Best cattle per cwt; secondary do, 52s to 54s per cwt; in to 46s. There was an increase in the number offered. They also were worse to sell, and had to be taken. Best sheep, 7½d to 8d per lb; do, 7d to 7½d.—At our sale yesterday, and in the market to-day we had large supplies of both cattle, numbering 551 of the former and 400 of the latter. The quality of the whole was excellent, and with attendance of buyers, stock sold freely at current prices for all kinds were lower; sheep estimated making about 2s per head less money than last week. There is no advice of any States cattle for next week, with reduced shipments of dead meat we look for improving prices.
