SALFORD CATTLE MARKET, This Day.—Supply of cattle about the same as last week, but that of sheep and lambs larger. Prime beef met a good demand, at rather higher prices; other sorts unchanged. Sheep and lambs sold at about late rates; calves inactive. Cattle, 4½d to 7d; sheep, 6d to 7½d; lambs, 9d to 10½; calves, 6d to 7d per lb.
