**FINANCIAL CONDITION OF TIPPERARY UNION.—**  
At the weekly meeting of the Tipperary Board  
of Guardians, a letter was read from the National  
Bank, calling the attention of the guardians to  
the fact that their account was overdrawn to  
the extent of £3,577, and requesting that the  
guardians would take immediate steps to have  
the overdraft paid off, and, pending its payment,  
not to issue any further cheques, as they could  
not continue to be honoured. The following  
order was then made:—"Read and ordered—  
That the treasurer be informed that the board  
will be in a position at some time to have a large  
balance to their credit; and we call upon the  
collectors to use greater exertions in the collec-  
tion of the large amount of outstanding rates."

**MILITARY FUNERAL.—**The remains of Private  
Cullen, Leinster Regiment, who was drowned  
while bathing on Thursday evening were interred  
with military honours to-day in Mount St  
Lawrence cemetery. The coffin was borne from  
the New Barracks to the cemetery on a gun  
carriage of the Royal Artillery drawn by four  
horses. It was enveloped in the Union Jack,  
and bore the helmet and belt, &c, of the deceased.  
Preceding the bier was the band of the Leinster  
Regiment with muffled drums, &c, playing *en route*  
the Dead March in Saul and other funeral airs.  
The rear of the mournful procession was com-  
posed of a long line of the rank and file of the  
regiment walking two deep. Colonel Stewart  
and Lieutenant-Colonel Campbell were amongst  
the officers who attended the funeral.
