discharged with a caution, and the others who
were six or eight years his senior were sent to
prison for 14 days in default of finding bail.

Seven women were prosecuted for fighting in
John-street, on Thursday night. The police, it
appeared, had great difficulty in separating them,
and there was much disorder. The accused were
sent to gaol for seven days.

John Renahan was sentenced to a month's im-
prisonment for assaulting his brother-in-law,
named Fitzmaurice, who resides in Palmerstown.

A young woman named Bridget Hannon was
put forward by Head-Constable Wall, charged
with causing the death of Bridget DeLacy on the
1st June.

Mr Counihan, solicitor, defended the accused.

Dr Nolan, one of the uni n doctors, deposed
that on the 6th June DeLacy was placed under
his care in the workhouse hospital; she had a
black mark over one of the eyebrows, and on
further examination he found several black marks
on the back of the right wrist and forearm; the
woman died on the 11th June, never having re-
gained consciousness while under his care; on the
18th inst the witness held a post-mortem exami-
nation, the result of which he described, and as-
cribed the cause of death to inflammation of the
brain.

A man named Maurice Hickey, an attendant in
the George Hotel, deposed to having seen the
deceased and the prisoner (both of whom were
employed in the hotel) on the day in question.
Bridget DeLacy was going up stairs with a
bucket of water in her hand, and the prisoner
was coming down. They met on the stairs some
four steps from the base, and Hannon put some
question to the other woman about puddings and
pies. Prisoner struck the deceased with her
hand, the blow causing the woman's head to bump
against the wall. Hannon then shoved DeLacy
down stairs, and the woman fell below in an
unconscious state.

Another witness named Clarke gave similar
evidence, and the case was then returned for trial
to the next Assizes. The Court refused bail for
the appearance of the prisoner.
