FUNERAL OF THE LATE DR. GLOSTER.

The funeral of this highly esteemed young gentleman took place yesterday morning. . The cortege was a very large and thoroughly representative one, testifying fully the widespread popularity of the deceased, and the respect in which he was held by all classes of the community. At nine o'clock the funeral left Parteen, arriving at St Munchin's Church a little after ten.
