FUNERAL OF THE LATE MRS. GRAHAM.—The
funeral of this estimable lady, whose demise we
announced in our last issue, was held to-day.
The interment took place on the demesne of
Castlecrine, and the large and representative as-
semblage which accompanied the remains to their
last resting place proved how highly the deceased
was held by all classes of the community, and
the regret universally expressed, that so kind
and charitable a lady had passed away at the
comparatively early age of 54 years. The
coffin was borne from the mansion on the shoul-
ders of some of the tenantry to the family
vault, about a quarter of a mile distant, and the
chief mourners were Colonel Graham,
husband, his sons, and the Messrs Studdert,
