ARREST FOR MOONLIGHTING IN TIPPERARY-A young farmer named Edward Ryan has been arrested at Glenbred, a place situate about nine miles from Thurles, on a charge of moonlighting. From the facts to hand, which are very meagre, it appears that a farmer named Hogan, living in the same townland, alleges that on this night, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock p.m. he and his family were startled by hearing gun-shots in his yard. Two men, disguised and armed, immediately entered his house, and fired shots, whilst other parties who remained in the yard kept up a fusilade. The men who entered the house took his gun, which was hanging in the kitchen, and all parties then decamped. Hogan gave information to the police which has, it is believed, led to the arrest of Ryan, who is a respectable farmer, and a prominent member of the National League. The accused will be brought before the magistrates at the court on Monday next, when the case will be investigated. At present he is detained in Clonmel gaol.
