Did man exist coeval with this animal in its native land? Probably, yes. We read that a head of the fossil elk, together with several urns and stone hatchets, ware discovered in Germany in the same drain. A still more important piece of evidence is supplied by the fact of the existence in the Royal Dublin Society Museum of a rib of this ancient animal, evidently bearing token of having been wounded by some sharp instrument, which remained, it is stated, long fixed in the wound, but had not penetrated so deep as to destroy the creature's life: it is such a wound as the head of an arrow would produce. Of the causes which involved the Irish elk in destruction—whether one general catastrophe affected the whole race whenever existing—whether local causes, operating at different epochs, have successively extinguished the species, which might have lingered the longest in Ireland, or whether its extermination has been effected by the hand of man, whose agency on the animal creation is everywhere apparent, no decided opinion can yet be given. We know that it existed, and that is all; its history and its fate, the writer adds, are buried beneath the shadow of years gone by.—Clonmel Chronicle.
