ALLEGED HOMICIDE IN THE CITY

Yesterday, at 3.20 o'clock, an inquest was opened at Nelson-street by Mr Coconer De Courcy, touching the death of a lacle boy named William Lyuch, of Little Glentworth street, who died on Sunday from, as alleged, the effect of injuries inflicted upon him by Mr James K Bogle, of Dominick street. The jury having been sworn and having viewed the body,

Dr Shanahan said as important issues were involved he should wish to be assisted by another doctor in the maxing of a post mortem examinetion. He had consulted with Dr Bourke as to the treatment of the deceased while attending bim, and he would suggest that that gentleman, who was now present, be named to ass st him in making the post mortem examination.

The Coroner said it was for the jury to say whether a second doctor should be employed for the purp se.

Mr Donnelly (a jucor)-Is it necessary that there should be a second doctor?

Dr Shanabaa-It is absolutely necessary.

Mr Hayes (a juror) thought Dr Bourke should be named as one second phys cian, and

This was unantmously agreed to.

Mr Doyle, as representing the accused, asked the medical gendlemen if they would object to a doctor, in the interest of the defendant, being present at the fost moriem examination.

Drs Shanahan and Bourke replied that they

had not the slightest objection.

Dr Holmes subsequently arrived, and said he wished to be present at the post mortem examina-

tion on sebalf of the accused.

Head-constable Wall identified the body of deceased, and read the deposition which he made on the 10th instant in presence of the accused. On Friday, the 3rd inscant, about half-past three o'clock, he was playing with another little They we e throwing pieces of tu lat rach other, and one of the pieces struck a child of Mrs The child went into the house crying, Gavin's. and Mr Boyle, who was standing at his own door, went over and gave deponent three boxes on the left side of the torchead. He did not feel any pain then, but afterwards his head became very sore, and he was suffering since. About a ford night before Michael Dillon struck him on the left side of the head with a piece of china, He was cut and bleeding, but the wound healed in three In reply to defendant, deceased said he davs. (lefendant) first caught him by the arm and knocked off his cap, which he got again.

The inquest was then adjourned to four o'clock

THIS DAY.

The inquest touching the death of the boy Lynch was resumed at 4 o'clock this afternoon in the Ci y Court rouse. Mr Connolly appeared for Mr Boyle, and Mr J

I Moran for the next-of-kin of deceased.

Dr Shanahan deposed that he attended the deceased; was called to see him on red ticket on the 5th October; he found him suffering from pain in left side of the head at the butt of the ear; hat pain extended up to the temple region on to the forehead-at least he described it so.

Mr Connolly said that was not evidence

Wilness—From the 5th October to the time of his death witness paid him frequent visits and found him suffering in the way described, except towards the end, when he became unconscious; witness's treatment was directed to this pain; his pulse was 72 on the first occasion when in a reclining position and accelerated to 90 when he was raised up; that condition lasted till Wednesday before his death; this indicated, as he believed, injury to the brain; on the 10th of October witness had the assistance of Dr Bourke; the boy died on Sunday, the 16th; the pain the by suffered from in the side of the head was very intense. It was not continuous, but came periodically, and he cried and shouted " Oh, My

bead;" yesterday he made a post mortem examination, assisted by Drs Bourke and Holmes; the body was very emaciated; from examination made superficially they found nothing to indicate that he had received a blow on the side of the head, or any mark of violence; under the skull cap they found no mark; the brain was congested but not more so at one side than the other; it appeared to be general; found no laceration of the brain; it was congested on the surface; found the kidneys darkly congested; after some further description of the examination, witness said that from the symptoms before death and the condition of things found in the post mortem examination, his opinion was that death resulted from general congestion of the membranes and surface of the brain caused by surenic poisoning and convulsions, consequent on latent and concealed kidney disease, and that a stroke on the cheek-

Mr Connolly—We have nothing to say to that. Witness—A blow or a fright would accelerate convulsions. Any shock to the nervous system, especially when there was kidney disease was liable to cause eurenic convulsions, and therefore to congestion of the brain.

In reply to Head Constable Wall, Dr Shanahan said that the child might have lived longer, even so suffering from the kidney disease, if he hadn't met with some cause that hastened on the development of the disease.

Mr Connolly asked was it not possible that this disease from which the child suffered might have caused his death, even 'if it were not accelerated by any cause whatever.

Dr Shanahan said that it was possible, but

probability was another thing.

Dr Bourke was examined and coincided with Dr Shanahan's evidence. He added that in his opinion the fatal result wasin a great degree owing to the condition of the kidneys. In reply to Mr Connolly, he said that disease of the kidneys might have resulted from natural causesfrom cold &c

Dr Holmes stated that he agreed with the

Medical evidence.

Mary Kate O'Reilly said that young Lynch and another boy were setting two smaller boys to fight, when Mr Boyle came over, shook him by the hand, took off his cap and threw it on his head again; that was all he did; he said, "don't do it again;" the boy oried.

Mrs Warren said that she happened to see Mr Boyle raise his hand, but she did not know that he struck anybody; it was some days after when she heard the child was sick.

To Mr Connolly—The raising of the hand might have been as he was taking off the cap.

The mother of the deceased was next examined and stated that four days afterwards the boy

complained of a pain in his head.

Mr Connolly said that he would not address the jury any remarks. It was clear from the whole surroundings of the case that Mr Boyle did nothing whatever to the child, that in any way accelerated his death.

Mr Moran reminded the jury of the boy's own deposition. He would not unduly press the case, but would leave it to their own common sense to say whether the boy's death was in any way

hastened or vecelerated.

The Foreman said that the jury had no evidence to corroborate the deposition of the deceased that he had received any blow from Mr Boyle, or any violence, and taking into account the medical testimony they were of opinion that death was the result of natural causes.

A verdict was found accordingly.
