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FIRE IN PATRICK STREET. A fire, which at first threatened to be of an alarming character, broke out on the premises known as the "Home Rule House," Patrickstreet, on Monday morning, at about two o'clock, a.m. Additional apprehension was caused owing to the fact that three or four families were living in the upper part of the premises, which are set in tenements. It appears that Mr Forrest, the City High Constable, on hearing about the fire at once proceeded to the Corporation depot and having got out the apparatus, appeared on the scene and endeavoured to get up the stairs in order to warn the sleeping inhabitants, but was unable to get beyond the first flight, owing to the stifling atmosphere, but some fresh hose having arrived and the water being laid on freely, the burning mass, after a while, showed indications of losing its power, and an effort was then mude to get the people safely away, and after considerable danger this was accomplished. A good deal of time was also spent in saving the furniture of the inhabitants from the burning building, but the greater part of it was at length rescued. Previous to the people being got safely from the fire, Mr Forrest not aware of the fact, very thought-got the Fire Escape but of away being course afterwards found it was unnecessary. Mr Forrest next directed his attention to the shop, where it is supposed the fire, accidentally, or otherwise, originated, and having burst through the door, found that the large counter inside was one mass of flames, and the shop being stocked with a large supply of matches, powder squibs, and other highly combustible materials, it was with difficulty that this part of the fire was got under. However, about four o'clock, owing to the constant supply of water, and the facility with which it was brought into connection with the hose, the flames were mastered, and it was then discovered that a great amount of valuable property had been destroyed in the shop, the counter being reduced to one mass of charcoal. Fortunately, the premises are, we understand, insured in the offices of the Commercial Union and London and Provincial Companies. Head-constable Wall and a party of policemen appeared on the scene before the fire had been mastered, and rendered what assistance they could, but to Mr Forrest is due the thanks for his timely efforts and thoughtruiness. We may mention that this gentleman also rendered valuable assistance at the recent fire in the markets, and was one of the first on the scene
