**JUBILEE YACHT RACE.**

The yacht race around the British coast started at Southend to-day, the Prince of Wales a distinguished company going on board to witness it. Southend was crowded in honour of the event, and was swarmed with excursionists who poured in

beginning at 11 a.m., the Press Association correspondent at Southend says the sun shone with great brilliancy, but the question which attracted the attention of practical yachtsmen was the condition of the wind, there being a calm. The race is for a prize of a guinea, and the course is around the coast of Ireland, leaving the mainland of Great Britain on the port hand. It will last for a fortnight, and will occupy about a fortnight. The correspondent telegraphing at one o'clock says—The scene both on land and water was animated as the hour approached which was fixed for noon. There was some delay in getting the competitors in consequence of the crowded channel, but a good start was effected and a moderate south-east wind blow- ing was signalled by the Prince of Wales from the Norham Castle, on which vessel the most fashionable company.

The correspondent says—There were only five yachts, the absent boat being the 'Athena' immediately after the signal the 'Athena' started off with the lead and was closely followed by the 'Aline', 'Gwendolin', and 'Selene', the yachts being together in a cluster at the end of the race.
