**ADDRESS TO THE EARL OF ERNE**.—A Jubilee  
soiree was held in the Ulster Hall, Belfast, last  
evening under the auspices of the District Orange  
Lodge, and was made the occasion for presenting  
an address of welcome and congratulation to the  
Earl of Erne, Grand Master of the Orangemen of  
Ireland, who presided. Lord Erne, in replying  
to the address, said that the venomous attacks  
made by their opponents in the House of Commons  
on the Orange institution proved its value as a  
bulwark of the liberties of the country, and also  
remarked that, though the number of the constitu  
tional representatives of Ireland had been re  
duced, there were now more Orangemen sitting  
in the House of Commons than ever before at one  
time. On the motion of Sir J. Preston, a resolu  
tion was passed assuring their countrymen of all  
creeds and classes of their desire to co-operate  
with them in every loyal practicable scheme for  
the good of the country, and earnestly repudia  
ting the charges of bigotry and intolerance so  
persistently made against them by professional  
agitators.
