DROMCOLLOGHER FAIR.—The 27th April Fair
had an average exhibit of stock. The demand

than low figures. This was disheartening to
farmers who, at great exertion, managed to feed
dry stock through the winter in the hope of
catching an increased price now. Farmers must

were—Yearlings bought at from £2 10s to £4;
two-year-old heifers, from £5 to £7 10s; in-calf
heifers, from £7 to £12; strippers from £6 to £8.

DEATH OF MR. WALTER KERR.—We regret to
announce the death of Mr Walter Kerr,
youngest brother of the Countess of Dunraven,
which occurred at Hyeres, in the South of France,
on Friday last. Mr Kerr left England some
months ago for the purpose of crossing Africa
from Zanzibar. His intention was to proceed
first to Emin Pasha, and thence westward by
whatever route he found most favourable. Hav-
ing made all his preparations, he was stricken
down with fever at Mombessa, on the eve of his
departure. After severe difficulty he made his
way to Cairo and from thence to the South of
France, but the terrible fever aching resulted in
complications which proved fatal. Some two
years ago Mr Kerr published the narrative of a
very successful journey which he made from the
Cape to Lake Nyassa. He was always full of
enthusiasm for African exploration, and his
premature death has cut short a career full of
promise.
