KILKENNY DISTRICT LUNATIC ASYLUM

We are glad to notice that Dr Wm Z Myles of Alderman Z Myles, J.P., of this city, has appointed by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to be Resident Medical Superintendent of Kilkenny Lunatic Asylum, which position had been rendered vacant by the death of the late Dr Delaney. Dr Myles was formerly Assistant Medical Superintendent of Richmond Lunatic Asylum, Dublin, the largest of the kind in Ireland, and is a most efficient and experienced medical superintendent, having been about twenty years connected with this institution, where his skill, attention, and kindness were conspicuous. Dr Myles holds the highest testimonials, including a resolution of the Board of Governors of Richmond Asylum, signed by Lord Powercourt, and also letters from the Resident Medical Superintendent, Dr Conolly Norman, the late Joseph Lalor, a former superintendent, Dr Banks, Dublin, Dr Wm J Martin, do, and the late Dr J Hughes, do. The principle of promotion has been observed in this instance, and we are certain that Dr Myles's well-merited appointment will give widespread satisfaction not only in Limerick but amongst the profession generally.

The *Dublin Evening Mail* says:—It will gratify the assistant medical officers of Irish lunatic asylums to learn that Dr W Z Myles, Senior Assistant of Richmond Lunatic Asylum, has been promoted to the vacant post of Medical Superintendent of the Kilkenny District Asylum. Dr Myles has had thirteen years' service at Richmond Lunatic Asylum, Dublin, which is the largest in Ireland, and for the past seven years he has been the Senior Assistant, so that he had abundant experience of the duties of his office both as regards the treatment of the insane and the administration of the asylum. Indeed the work of the Richmond Institution devolved upon him during the declining health of the late Dr Lalor.
