The ceremony was of an imposing character, and was attended by the Governors of all the Australian Colonies, including those of New Zealand and the Fiji Islands. Special thanksgiving services were held last Sunday at the Anglican and Roman Catholic cathedrals, the ceremony at the latter being attended by all the archbishops and bishops of Australia. The festivities in connection with the Centenary will extend over the whole of the present week, and will include the dedication of the Centennial Park, the opening of the Agricultural Society's Exhibition, a State banquet, and an International Anniversary Regatta, besides minor events. To-day, the anniversary of Captain Phillip's proclamation at Sydney Cove of the new colony, there is a general illumination. We learn by telegram that Sydney is *en fete*, and is crowded with visitors from all parts. A large number of invitations were issued by a commission specially formed for the purpose, to leading politicians and others, and the gathering is thoroughly representative of Australia. The magnificent Empire of Australia is thus the growth of a hundred years. It would demand a wider range of imagination than we possess to endeavour to form some conception of what Australia will be when next its Centenary comes round.
