The Marquis of Lansdowne, Viceroy of India

THE OPERATIONS IN ZULULAND.—The coast
column, under Major M'Kean, including the
native force under John Dunn, has started. It
will operate immediately against Somkeli's
stronghold, near St Lucia, and will afterwards
join the other column at N'konjeni, when a com-
bined attack will be made upon the Ceza bush,
where Dinizulu is known to be. It is officially
stated that Dinizulu's force numbers 2,000 men
of an alien tribe, his own Usutu followers having
deserted. Affairs have generally improved.

THE CHURCH AND DISSENTERS.—The *Morning*
Post says—We understand that the committee
of Lambeth Conference of Anglican Bishops
which has been considering the question of the
relations between Church and Dissent, have
reported in favour of recognizing the ministry of
non-episcopal Dissenting bodies as valid, though
irregular. This would appear to advocate inter-
change of pulpits, and other overtures to heretical
and schismatic bodies, which the Anglican Com-
munion, or at least the Church of England, can
never rightly assent to.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—On Monday night, about
12.20, a guard of a goods train, named Charles
Lenigar, residing at Waterford, aged between 45
and 50 years, was killed at Tipperary Railway
Station. It appears that he was standing on the
line whilst some wagons were being shunted back
to be attached to the van. The wagons ran
against him, knocking him down and passing
over his leg. He was at once removed to the
infirmary. Six medical gentlemen decided on
amputating the injured limb, but owing to the
previous loss of blood the deceased did not long
survive the operation, and died on Tuesday morn-
ing about 11.30.

DROWNED WHILE BATHING.—At Youghal on
Tuesday morning a young man named John
Delea, from Kilmallock, was drowned. The de-
ceased had only arrived there with his sister the
previous evening, and went to bathe on Tuesday
morning near the lighthouse, but going out too
far, and being unable to swim, was carried away
by a wave and drowned. The Coastguard boat
was manned, and arrived at the scene of the
accident, but could not find the body. A fishing
boat, however, picked it up, and towed it towards
the town, in place of taking the body on board
and running the boat ashore, as they were called
on by the Coastguard to do.
