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probably be to shut down much of the discontent that exists in the Conservative Parliamentary party, Mr Gladstone's action will have the result of drawing together the whole forces of Unionism in the House of Commons—drawing them together, packing them together again under the common flag. It is needless to say, we suppose, that that is a great and timely advantage under the circumstances; and the Unionist leaders of both parties, more particularly, have reason to thank Mr Gladstone for the promptitude with which he confers it on them.

THE GOVERNMENT POLICY.—The *Times*, commenting on yesterday's Conservative meeting, says—Mr W H Smith, we are glad to see, announced in the most unequivocal manner that the Government intend to resist any attempt to pass just so much of their original proposals as it pleases the Opposition to adopt. Let him maintain that tone, and leave no excuse for any cantankerous person to pretend that he thinks the question of the 9th Clause an open one. Then if these fussy people, who imagine that every detail of a complicated measure must be squared to suit their peculiar notions, choose to swell the ranks of the Opposition, they will know, and the country will know, that they are voting for the expulsion of the Government from power. Lord Hartington, we understand, will explain at a meeting of Liberal Unionists to-day that the Government consented to drop the obnoxious licensing clauses on the express understanding that they are dropped *en bloc*, and that the treatment of the subject is postponed without prejudice. We cannot doubt that the Liberal Unionists will honourably act upon that understanding, and will decline to be misled into supporting Sir William Harcourt.
